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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Are you challenged by the acuity and complexity of today's acute care patients? This course is designed to develop the clinical decision-making of participants so that they can provide safe, effective and evidence-based therapy to adult acute care patients. The equipment that is encountered in the acute care environment will be reviewed. Discussion of lab values, test results and medications will highlight the impact of this information on the patient evaluation and intervention. Through lectures and case studies, participants will develop the ability to select tests and measures, prioritize problems, provide high-quality intervention and recognize signs of patient instability in cardiac, medical, surgical, orthopedic and neurological patients.

FACULTY

Jackie Mulgrew PT, CCS is a graduate of Liverpool University, England. In 2003 she became a board certified Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Clinical Specialist and has worked in major acute care hospitals in England and the United States. She is currently the Clinical Specialist for the cardiac medical and surgical services at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston, MA. Jackie is the co-author of **Minimally Invasive Hip Arthroplasty versus Traditional Hip Arthroplasty Surgery: Early Functional Outcomes and the Impact on Frequency and Duration of Acute Care Physical Therapy** (Acute Care Perspectives, 2006)

Alison Squadrito, PT, DPT, GCS received her BA in psychology from Harvard University, an MS in Physical Therapy from Duke University and a DPT from the MGH Institute of Health Professions. In 2001 she became a board certified Geriatric Clinical Specialist. She is also certified in vestibular rehabilitation. Currently, Alison is the Clinical Specialist for the medical service at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston, MA. She is co-author of **Acute Care Physical Therapist Evaluation and Intervention for an Adult after Right Hemispherectomy** (Physical Therapy, 2003) and author of **Physiologic Response to Increased Load and Oxygen Demand in the Aging Adult** (In: Cynthia Coffin-Zadai, Scot Irwin, eds. Clinical Exercise Pathophysiology. In press.).

Consultant: Regina F. Doherty OTD, MS, OTR/L is an occupational therapist with over 15 years of clinical experience. She is currently a full time lecturer at Tufts University where she teaches courses in health conditions, clinical reasoning and occupation and adaptation.
